I should mention that I check out all web sites I mention and believe they are functioning at the time I created this news letter. I have had some comments that some have had problems when they try to print out my newsletters from the e-mail or the web site. I have to admit I did not allow for this in my first ones, however I am trying to create them in a narrower format so they will print properly.

If this is still a problem for you perhaps you can use this tip:

Go to my web site at www.thecomputerman.biz. Click on the link to More Pages. Then click on the Newsletters Link. Click on the link to the newsletter you want to view and print. In the Internet Explorer menu at the top of the page click on File. Click on Print Preview. If the page looks like it is all fitting on the page width then you can safely print it. If it is not fitting on the width of the page in the preview window....you need to adjust the page margins.

To adjust the page margins, Click on "Close" to exit the print preview screen. Once again click on File and then click on Page Setup. In the window that pops up, change the left and right margins each to "0" (zero) and the top and bottom margins to .25 each. Now go back and try the Print Preview and see if all the page is showing. If so, then it is safe to print.

This tip is useful to try before printing any web page. By the way, this setting should remain like that when you return to Internet Explorer, so you should not have to re-set it again. Hope this helps....

WINDOWS — Tricky Shutdown Tips:

Has your mouse pointer ever disappeared, or your mouse stop working? What to do?? Here's a keyboard shortcut that can at least give you the option of a "normal" shut-down.

Ctrl-Esc pulls up your Start menu, and the up-arrow key enables you to choose Shut Down.

And here's another tip: If you're not sure whether your computer is "frozen," tap the NumLock key. If the Num Lock light goes out (or if you had set NumLock off, if the Num Lock light goes on), your computer isn't "completely" frozen! Then you might want to try the first tip!

Here's another tip for Microsoft Word....(May vary with your version of Word)

Did you ever create a long document and then want to create a summary? With Word 2000 or newer, it's a piece of cake! With the document open, choose Tools - Auto Summarize! Check out your options (which probably won't need to be changed), then choose OK.

The summary points in your document will now be highlighted in yellow!

How does Word know which are your "summary points?" Basically, it "assumes" that the first sentence in each paragraph is the "summary" of that paragraph.

You'll also see a floating toolbar which enables you to "put together" and save or print the summary notes!

WINDOWS TIPS

— [How to Remove Fonts from your computer:](#)

Did you ever notice that there are some fonts you know you'll NEVER use? Here's how to get rid of them:

To remove a font from your computer:

1. Click **Start**, point to **Settings**, click **Control Panel**, and then double-click **Fonts**.
2. Click the icon for the font you want to delete.
3. On the **File** menu, click **Delete** (or just tap the **Delete Key!**).

Note To select more than one font to add or remove, hold down the CTRL key, and then click each of the fonts you want. Then you can delete them!

— Maximizing, Minimizing, Restoring Windows:

For those who aren't bull's-eye accurate with their mouse, you might find this tip a useful one: To maximize, minimize or close your current program, you don't need to hit those tiny boxes in the upper right of the active window. You can just go to any part of the title bar (that's the top bar of the window), RIGHT-mouse click, and choose Minimize, Maximize or Close from there! There are a couple of other options you'll have as well; it's worth a try!

-Keyboard shortcuts for left-handed users:

Though it may seem at times as if the world was designed with only right-handed people in mind, Windows has a few keyboard shortcuts designed for the lefties.

Lefties definitely find it cumbersome to use the Cut, Copy, and Paste keyboard shortcuts. [Ctrl]X, [Ctrl]C and [Ctrl]V are only accessible if you're using your left hand, but since lefties are using their left hand on the mouse, Windows has also created these handy shortcuts on the right side of the keyboard.

For Left-Handers

Cut : [Shift][Delete]

Copy : [Ctrl][Insert]

Paste : [Shift][Insert]

Undo : [Alt][Backspace]

Unfortunately, not all applications work with these shortcuts. Do some experimenting to find out whether your applications include these shortcuts for lefties!
